## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2018

The Trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2018. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The Objects of TDC ("the Objects") are to further such charitable purposes for the benefit of the inhabitants of economically and socially or socially disadvantaged communities in South East England as the Trustees see fit, in particular but not exclusively by:

- 1. developing their capacity and skills and advancing education in such a way that they are better able to identify, and help meet, their needs and to participate more fully in society;
- 2. advancing education including, but not limited to the foregoing, the provision of training;
- 3. providing, in the interests of social welfare, facilities for recreation and other leisure-time occupation with the object of improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants having need of such facilities by reason of their age, youth, sex, race, infirmity, disablement, sexual orientation, gender, poverty or social or economic circumstances; and
- 4. promoting the elimination of unfair discrimination on the grounds of race, sex or disability and encouraging equality of opportunity.

#### **Public benefit**

In shaping our objectives and planning our activities for the year, the Trustees have given consideration to the duties set out in section (17) 5 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit. In particular, the Trustees have considered how the planned activities will contribute to the overall aims and objectives that they have set.

The Board believes that TDC's work with communities, as detailed in this report, are fully in line with TDC's objectives. We proactively seek to tackle economic, social and health inequalities by supporting people to build strong communities. The Trustees believe that the following sections show clearly the benefit that TDC provides to the public.

#### Volunteers

A valuable contribution to the work of TDC continues to be made by our volunteers, including our voluntary Trustees. TDC has also offered a varied range of opportunities for people to volunteer and contribute to their communities. This includes work funded by the Department of Health for a volunteering project, which focused on improving health and well-being in our work with BME communities and with young people.

#### STRATEGIC REPORT

#### Achievement and performance

Charitable activities

The Trust for Developing Communities (TDC) is a values driven community development charity with a strong track record of delivering grassroots community led solutions to tackle inequality in Brighton and Hove.

TDC's key work continues to be the delivery of community development support directly within neighbourhoods across the city. 2017-18 was a very strong year of delivery, as we supported over one thousand community members to contribute to over a hundred community groups. Our Community Development Workers, based within neighbourhoods, supported over 11,000 hours of volunteering within community groups and brought in £156k of additional funding, £38k in grants and £118k of in-kind support.

Our Citywide work to support community of identity groups across the city included work with ADHD Aware, BME 50+ Group, Community Buildings Network, Ethrag, Mosaic, No Holds Barred, Racial Harassment Forum, and the Sussex Peer to Peer Network.

Through the Healthy Neighbourhood Fund we supported community members to lead the process in awarding £28k to 84 community groups, in eleven areas, working to improve the health and well-being of people within neighbourhoods - which saw over 4,000 beneficiaries.

We greatly expanded our youth work during the year. TDC supported young people to lead successful campaigning to 'Protect Youth Services' and a new Youth Led Grants Programme was launched, by the Council. TDC successfully secured two new contracts, launching new youth work in the East of the City and growing our work in the North. Our community development work with young people features a mix of detached youth work and group based work; including specialist work with visually impaired young people, work on a Traveller site, sports clubs, bike workshops, a summer programme and more. The new programme replaced Brighton & Youth Collective funding, in which TDC have played a central role in a strong partnership, which was successfully concluded.

We delivered youth work in partnership with the Sussex Police and Crime Commissioner, and brought together our youth work and community development work to deliver inter-generational work to address significant anti-social behaviour in one neighbourhood. Additionally we delivered Health and Wellbeing Youth Work on behalf of Sussex Community Foundation NHS Trust, delivering both group work and one to one work; and delivered well-being work to support young people around Pride.

We worked in partnership with local business to deliver the Tech Trail as part of the Brighton Digital Festival - supporting young people from marginalised communities to increase their employability by visiting local digital companies and finding out about potential career paths. We also completed our year as the i360's first ever charity partner and thank them for their support.

Our Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) engagement work included work to support communities to contribute to local decision making on urban planning, employability, diabetes care, and exploring the intersections of ethnicity, culture, sexuality and gender expression. We have also supported RISE to enable their domestic violence work to more effectively reach people from BME communities and supported Impetus to examine how their Neighbourhood Care Scheme might work better for people from BME communities. We worked in partnership with Community Works to deliver an Equalities Symposium focusing on hardship and opportunity as faced, in particular, by individuals from BME communities and from the Deaf community. Our psychosocial work included running a large multi-partner health and well-being event for BME communities.

Over 800 older people benefited from TDC's adult social care funded work across the city, and we continued to deliver Dementia Friends training to a range of community groups.

TDC continued to deliver training and consultancy work, completing another tranche of our C-ODE community development training and we ran a range of bespoke courses for statutory and voluntary sector partners.

#### STRATEGIC REPORT

#### Financial review

Financial position - overview

In 2017-18 TDC achieved £652,696 income and a surplus of £529. Our end of year position is an increase of £34,962 on unrestricted funds, raising our unrestricted reserves to £255,055 (2017: £220,093). Additionally we have £38,567 (2017: £73,000) in restricted reserves - leaving us with a total reserves position of £293,622 (2017: £293,093).

#### Investment policy and objectives

All TDC monies held in reserves are spread across different financial institutions that are covered by the £85,000 maximum Financial Services Compensation Scheme. We review the investment income from these funds regularly at Finance Sub Committee meetings and weigh this against speed of access to monies.

#### Reserves policy

The TDC reserves policy has remained consistent since 2009: "The Trustees believe that the reserves target should be sufficient for six months' expenditure." This would cover, if necessary, any redundancy payments due to employees, support to employees in finding alternative employment, terminating service contracts such as rent, telephone, broadband, etc. and a contingency sum for outstanding liabilities such as accountancy, audit and other professional costs, or obtaining alternative funding to continue TDC's work in whole or in part.

The Trustees continue to designate unrestricted funds to specific purposes including a Designated Redundancy Fund. No changes were made to our designated unrestricted funds during the year.

#### **Future plans**

Our home city of Brighton & Hove is a uniquely creative and progressive city, which faces many challenges - there are areas where 43% of our children live in poverty and life expectancy is nine years shorter; whilst across the city we have the fourth highest level of suicide in the country and the second highest number of people sleeping on our streets. This is not ok.

A new Chief Executive and Chair of Trustees in 2017 presented TDC with an opportunity to take stock of our strengths from a fresh perspective - and review how we can most effectively tackle inequality in our city for the future. Having successfully delivered a broad range of highly responsive grassroots community development and engagement work for eighteen years, TDC has built up strong trusting relationships with communities, commissioners and partners, an empowered and highly motivated team of staff and healthy reserves.

TDC aims to continue to develop as a dynamic, impactful and sustainable charity. We have the opportunity to further integrate the varied work we deliver and proactively pilot new approaches and innovative community led solutions. By showing that tackling inequality benefits everyone in the city of Brighton and Hove, we also aim to inspire people around the country and the whole world.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## **Governing document**

The Trust for Developing Communities (TDC) was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 3 March 2000 and received charitable status on 5 November 2004.

Its governing document is its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 3 March 2000, as amended at an Extraordinary General Meeting held on 12 December 2002 and again as the General Meeting held on 20 October 2004 and 18th October 2016.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Board Membership**

TDC would like to thank Trustees who stepped down during the year, in particular Grant Scott who is an exemplary role model through his journey from participant to community volunteer, to Chair of his local group, to TDC Trustee and concluding as Chair of the TDC Board. Professor Gail Findlay was appointed as our new Chair of Trustees, after being co-opted onto the Board in 2017 and elected as a full Trustee at our Annual General Meeting (AGM). Gail, a Brighton resident for over eighteen years, brings a wealth of experience from running the Well Communities programme at the University of East London, where she is Director of Health Improvement.

There is a range of skills represented on the Board, and a good mix of different sections of the community. The Trustees must consist of at least five and not more than 15 individuals. Each year TDC holds an AGM, with invitations sent to all Members and to a wide range of people and organisations with whom we work, where annual accounts and annual report are presented and there are elections for Trustees. One third of the Trustees must retire at each AGM, though may stand for re-election.

#### **Recruitment and Induction of Trustees**

Prospective Trustees undertake an application process, including attending Board meetings as an observer. Trustees then vote to co-opt suitable candidates onto the Board. Co-optees are then put forward for election by TDC's Members at the AGM. New Trustees undergo a thorough induction process which includes appropriate legal checks.

#### **Board Meetings and Sub-Committees**

The Board oversees the work of TDC, meeting at least four times a year, receiving reports from the staff and from its Sub-Committees. The Board offers both organisational support and scrutiny, sets policy, reviews reports on delivery and financial performance, agrees the annual budget and takes decisions on major matters.

In 2017-18 TDC operated three Sub-Committees: Personnel and Employment, Finance and Strategy. Minutes of sub-committee meetings were received by the Board and decisions taken in relation to their recommendations.

### **Management and Staffing**

The Trustees delegate day to day decision making to the Chief Executive who is supported by an experienced and dedicated Management Team.

The Board would like to express their appreciation to Chris Whitwell, for his wise guidance whilst performing the role of Interim Chief Executive during the year, which included leading a thorough external recruitment process for a new Chief Executive. Trustees were delighted to appoint Athol Halle, who took up the post of Chief Executive in October 2017, who joined TDC after 11 successful years as Chief Executive of Groundswell, a charity which takes a community development approach to tackling homelessness. Athol has brought a fresh perspective and dynamism to TDC and has begun leading transformation work to review and update internal systems, further increase our impact and develop an ambitious and inspiring future vision.

The Board would like to pay tribute to our Management Team, who maintained such a high level of successful delivery, throughout a year of transition and to all our frontline staff for their dedication and skill.

#### Remuneration

Matters of recruitment and remuneration are overseen by TDC's Personnel and Employment Sub-committee who set rates of pay in reference to the NJC scales, and benchmarking with similar organisations.

#### Relationships with Related Parties, including Key Partnerships

Strong partnership working is key to the success of TDC - and we continue to work closely with a broad range of community groups, charities, statutory bodies, academic institutions and businesses to benefit communities.

#### Risk management

TDC's risk management strategy includes a regular thorough review of the risks that we may encounter. This informs the ongoing development of policies and procedures which serve to mitigate identified risks. We are proactive in addressing risk and have reporting systems that enable organisational response to be swift and effective.

The Trustees regularly consider the major risks to which TDC is potentially exposed and are confident that controls are in place to mitigate those risks. We pay particular attention to our work with vulnerable adults and children - ensuring we have robust safeguarding and child protection policies and procedures in place.

The Trustees have been proactive in developing a sustainable business model to ensure that our essential work with communities can continue to address need and can further increase its impact into the future.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and on that basis the charity is considered to be a going concern.

#### Reconciliation with previous generally accepted accounting principles

In preparing the accounts the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS102 and the Charities SORP FRS102 the restatement of comparative items was required. No restatement of comparative items was required.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from donations is accounted for as received by the charity. The income from fundraising ventures is shown gross, with associated costs included in fundraising costs. The value of voluntary work is not included in the financial statements.

Grants are recognised in full in the SOFA in the year in which they are receivable. Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are credited to restricted income when they are receivable. Where the use of the asset is restricted, depreciation is charged against the restricted fund. Where the use of the asset is not restricted it is transferred to the general fund.

Other income, including investment income, is recorded on an accruals basis.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK Corporation Tax purposes. Accordingly the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2018

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **Fund accounting**

The charity has various types of funds for which it is responsible.

#### 17. FUNDS

The purpose of each restricted fund was as follows:

Community Development: 'CD Projects': Bevendean, Hollingdean & Saunders Park, Moulsecoomb and Bates, Queens Park and Craven Vale, South Portslade & Portland Road, Tarner and Eastern Road.

TDC continue to develop and support a range of community organisations in each of these neighbourhoods as funded by the Third Sector Investment Programme of Brighton & Hove City Council (TSIP BHCC).

#### **BME** Engagement

To facilitate effective engagement across the city with marginalised Black and Minority Ethnic groups and communities to contribute to council decision making. Commissioned through TSIP BHCC, including funding from the Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG).

#### BME Psychosocial

To improve the mental health management and well-being of BME communities across the city through building relations with mental health services and engaging with members of BME communities. Commissioned by BHCC and the CCG.

#### Citywide

To deliver flexible community development support to community based organisations across the city. Commissioned through TSIP BHCC.

#### Consolidated Youth Work

Up to October working across four small areas in partnership with Brighton & Hove Youth Collective members to deliver youth work through group activities and projects. Commissioned by BHCC. Then from October TDC were re-commissioned to deliver youth work in two larger areas in both the North and East of the city.

#### Dementia Project

Working with Age UK and the Dementia Action Alliance partnership to deliver dementia friends training to raise awareness and to support people experiencing dementia in the city.

#### Locally Based Activities for Older People

To deliver community development work with older people.

#### Peacehaven Downlands Project

Delivering community development work with older people in Downlands Court in Peacehaven.

#### Patient Participation CD Project

To increase participation in GP surgery Patient Participation groups and representative engagement in health matters.

#### Department of Health HSCVF Grant

To improve health and care through neighbourhood community activity and volunteering to tackle loneliness.

#### C-ODE

TDC's accredited training course in community development (Community - Organisations, Development and Engagement).

### BBC Children in Need

A grant to deliver youth work in our neighbourhoods with children and young adults.

#### Healthy Neighbourhood Fund TSIP- BHCC

We support community organisations to distribute funds from Public Health to groups engaged in activities that improve the health of people in their communities.
