Mid Term Evaluation Findings: Themes and Activity

Community co-production and design

Outreach to the community to establish priorities and to PCNs / surgeries for priorities

Community health engagement

Leafleting, social media, posters, newsletters, door-step engagement, health events

Health interventions

BP monitoring, health checks, screening and monitoring activity, referrals to primary care

Lifestyle health interventions, health support activity and targeted community activity, aging well, smoking cessation etc.

System change and systemic approaches

Policy review, service reorientation and reprioritisation of interventions

Over 50,000 reached with information

8,000 attended events

• 3,000 referred to clinical or preventative activities

Health Forums in all four areas of city

- Patient Participation & Community Groups
- Primary Care Network and GPs
- Voluntary and Community Services



As one of the early attendees of the BN2 health Forum I was surprised at how few local residents were involved in it but over time, through the efforts of TDC, great strides have been made to connect the local residents to health services where they can voice their concerns and priorities around health and social connections.

I believe in the importance of continuing to develop our forum at a grassroots level, because it really finds out what the issues are locally. The benefits of this approach is one of prevention and that can only be a good thing.

Great progress has been made to highlight help for diabetes, bowel cancer, long covid, Macmillan & mental health care. The involvement of the local GP practices has been invaluable in shaping a collaborative approach to community health.

As a local resident I thank all those who voluntarily give up time to help others and those professionals who have an uphill task in providing care in the community with limited resource.

• 105 Blood Pressure checks, community markets, groups and events (302 citywide)

• 118 signposted to other service or community activity (253 citywide)

• 29 signposted to health professional (84 citywide)

Having my blood pressure taken at the Bevy, where I go for lunch on Friday was much easier than at my GP. The machine there is noisy, and I am scared to use it. Talking to the pharmacist, I learned about starting a blood pressure diary.

Impacting Clinical Outcomes: Hypertension

Joanna Martindale - CEO Hangleton and Knoll Project, West

- **Courses -19 participants** over two courses and another starting March 2024. Co-produced with community and Federation staff and GP identified participants.
- Outreach events to targeted groups, e.g. 50+, ESOL/BRM
- 147 blood pressures taken


West Health Event identified 51 conditions including:

- 18 with dangerously high blood pressure
- 2 undiagnosed diabetics
- 53 other referrals. e.g. weight management

Extending Reach

Small grants for racially minoritised and LGBTQ+ community groups

Dr Onyeka Erobu, TDC Senior Health Manager

Racially minoritised strand

• **Ten grants awarded**: £5,000 each to Bridging Change, HKP, Switchboard; £1,000 each to seven small groups via TDC

• Themes covered: NHS services, cancer screening, menopause, mental health, diabetes, health checks

Impact

- Opportunities for capacity-building
- New city-wide service translating written information on menopause
- Consolidation of relationships with several organisations

Insights

- Preferred methods of engagement texts, WhatsApp, and in-person conversations.
- A combination of targeted work and integration into mainstream activity is vital to enhancing impact in ethnically and culturally diverse groups.



Extending Reach

Inclusion Award and small grants LGBTQ+ community groups **Jason Saw,** Interim CEO, Switchboard



Inclusion Award (covering LGBTQ+ history and inequalities, language, heteronormativity, trans health, inclusive policies and environment)

• Goldstone PCN, East and Central PCN, Citizens Advice (including Cancer Services and Trauma)

Grassroots Groups Award reaching multiple marginalized groups who are often not accessing health services. E.g.

Radical Rhizomes QTIPOC (Queer, Trans, Intersex People of Colour)
 Neurodivergent People and Supporters group, Brighton Care Collective,
 Fat Club Brighton, Grow Your Life, Trans Sauna Takeover

Insights

• Enabled us to identify and support already existing community solutions to health and wellbeing challenges.

• Created opportunity for Switchboard and health services to improve reach into LGBTQ+ communities where their healthcare access and engagement challenges.

Supporting growth and development of community initiatives.



Spotlight:

Bridging Change, Women's Mosque Wellbeing and Health Awareness sessions

• 200 reached with health-related information in person

32 people signposted to GP/Clinician and relevant community support/services

1,000 reached online

 Ethnic groups reached – Afghani, North African, Pakistani, Libyan, Syrian, Moroccan, Bangladeshi, Algerian, Sudanese, Indian, Somali, and White British
